


## Downtown medical school now recruiting students for the inaugural class to begin Aug. 2022

\$75 million project will revitalize five historic buildings

Project Downtown: The Master Plan for Wichita recognizes the William Street corridor as a key catalyst for the transformation of our downtown into a vibrant urban center. The proposed Kansas Health Science Center – Kansas College of Osteopathic Medicine (KHSC-KansasCom) project will revitalize five historic buildings (see individual projects listed below) along this corridor – bringing the vision set forth in Project Downtown to life.

The proposed KHSC-KansasCom project is also the catalyst for the redesign of Chester I. Lewis Reflection Square Park. Now that the project is moving forward, the community engagement process for the transformation of this key urban park into a public gathering space can begin.



















On Dec. 13, 2021, The Kansas Health Science Center - Kansas College of Osteopathic Medicine (KHSC-KansasCom) announced that the school has received approval from the Commission on Osteopathic College Accreditation (COCA) to start recruiting students for the 2022 academic year after receiving pre-accreditation status. The anticipated size of the inaugural class is 85 students with plans for continued growth each year. View a press release to learn more.

At the mayor's news briefing on December 3, 2020, representatives from the proposed KHSC-KansasCOM announced that the school has been granted candidate status from the Commission on Osteopathic College Accreditation. This important step in the accreditation process allows the project to move forward with plans for this forward-thinking medical school.
